Course Description. This course is designed to provide a historical overview of the Church and society in western Europe from the eleventh through the fifteenth centuries. Thus, this course will investigate high and late medieval Christianity in its social and its cultural context. Narrative and theological story lines to be pursued will include medieval monasticism and other new forms of religious life; heresy and its repression; scholasticism, the university and Gothic architecture; the bid for papal monarchy; means of Christianization; saints, relics, pilgrimage and other forms of popular devotion; the decline of the late-medieval papacy and conciliarism; late-medieval heresy; Christianity and other world religions (especially Judaism and Islam); and late-medieval attempts at reform. We will also be strengthening our skills as interpreters of primary sources. Therefore, bring **printed** copies of the primary readings (most linked below) to class. Some attention will be paid to major historiographical issues. No prerequisites.

Written Requirements. The course will be graded on the basis of:

- A) 30%: brief, unannounced, in-class quizzes. These will be given *approximately* once a week throughout the semester and will cover the readings assigned for the day. Each student's lowest quiz grade will be dropped, but it is imperative to keep up with the weekly readings to maintain a good quiz average.
- B) 35%: a written "bluebook" mid-term exam on MARCH 7, 2018.
- C) 35%: a written "bluebook" final: date, time and location TBA by the Registrar.

(the final is not cumulative; it covers only material from the second half of the course)

Students may not substitute a paper for these written examinations. However, a student may write a paper *in addition* to the exams if desired; please consult the teaching fellow no later than **November 1, 2017** to discuss potential topics.

Classroom Etiquette. Be on time. Cell phones are to be turned off throughout the class, and should NEVER ring during sessions. Laptops **may not be used** in this class.

Arts of Ministry Credit. This course may be used to obtain almost any of the required Arts of Ministry Credits.
